Feasts this week

17th: St Patrick. The legend

that St Patrick's expelled snakes from Ireland only

appeared in a book by a

Cistercian monk, Jocelin of

Furness, in the 12th century

and St Patrick's association

with the shamrock came

much later in the

17th century. The Professor

of Ecclesiastical History at

St Patrick's College

Maynooth said many of the

stories circulated about

Patrick come from oral

tradition, but "something

would not circulate without it being depicted in iconography,"

so the appearance of St Patrick holding a shamrock so late in

history is "quite unusual".

What we know from St Patrick's own writings,

his *Confessions* and the *Letter to Coriticus*, is that he was the

son of a deacon, grandson of a priest and was enslaved aged

16. He was brought to Ireland and tended herds, praying a

hundred times by day, and a hundred times by night.

18th: St Cyril of Jerusalem, 315-86, Bishop of Jerusalem. He

excelled as a catechist and administrator, and suffered exile in

his fight against Arianism

19th: The virtues of **St Joseph** have been the object of

ecclesial reflection down through the centuries, especially the

more recent centuries. Among those virtues the


following stand out: faith, with which he fully accepted God's

Two Important Feasts

This coming week we celebrate two big feast days. On March 17th we celebrate the feast of Principle Patron saint of Ireland St Patrick and two days later March 19th we celebrate the feast of St Joseph the Husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster Father of Jesus. Although four centuries separated these great saints both men shared something in common – they were both willing to give their all for God – even giving up their very lives if God required it of them. They saw that they were only pilgrims on this planet – simply passing through and it was what they did in this life would determine where they would spend eternity in the next life. Let us always having recourse to the saints asking them to pray for us that we may love Jesus Christ to the same extent they did – willing to obey anything God asks of us.

Why do we wear Shamrock on St Patricks day ?

It might surprise people to learn that St. Patrick, our national saint, was not born in Ireland. Some claim he was born in Wales. Others say Scotland or Brittany. But we do know that he was an immigrant to Ireland, who, it is believed, came here as a slave. St Patrick felt a call from God to spread the message of Christianity throughout this island. To help people understand better the mystery of the Triune God (Three persons in one God) he used a piece of shamrock with three leaves. One leaf representing the Father, the other leaf representing the son and the third leaf representing the Holy ghost. This is why we wear shamrock today as a sign of our belief in the most Holy Trinity who alone is worthy of all our praise and thanksgiving.

Rath and The Islands Parish Assembly met via Zoom on Tuesday 2nd March 2021.

The following topics were discussed:

Funeral Teams: A discussion was held about the role of Funeral Teams. Volunteers required (would need to be comfortable and empathetic in a bereavement situation). Recently bereaved families have expressed how the pandemic has taken the pressure off the families and enabled them spend quality time with the deceased. The funeral team is seen as a natural evolution. Training can be carried out mainly on line with one face to face session.

Finance Committee: Accounts are being finalised and the finance committee need to sign off on the accounts. Skibbereen Parish and Rath and the Islands Parish are two separate entities in their accounts and finances.

Web Site/WebCam: Thanks was expressed to all involved in the setting up of the Church Web Cam which is used daily for mass and was much admired and appreciated by a recently bereaved family. Sunday and Daily Mass is in its 3rd month. Feedback has been positive with regards to sound and picture quality. St Patricks Breastplate

St. Patrick's Breastplate is a popular prayer attributed to one of Ireland's most beloved patron saints. According to tradition, St. Patrick wrote it in 433 A.D. for divine protection before successfully converting the Irish King Leoghaire and his subjects from paganism to Christianity. (The term breastplate refers to a piece of Armor worn in battle.)


