Feasts this week

8th; St Senan was born near Ki I rush, Co. Clare. His family were prosperous farmers. His vocation seems to have resulted from an experience of danger from the sea. His early studies were mainly made at the monastery of Kilnamanagh. His principal monastic foundation was on Scattery Island, near Ki I rush, in the Shannon Estuary. He was anam chara to Ciaran of Clonmacnois and Brendan, and died in 544. 9th: St Frances of Rome, d. 1440, lived a happily married life and founded a society of women with the Rule of St Benedict and became a member of it after her husband's death.

11th; St Aengus (Oengus) was a monk in Clonenagh, Co. Laois, who came to the monastery at Tallaght at the end of the eighth century during the abbacy of Maelruain to spend a period under his direction. He was renowned for his devotion to both foreign and native saints and composed two martyrologies. He returned to Clonenagh, where he became abbot and bishop. He died around 824.

St Aengus: Called Dengus and "the Culdee," a hermit and author of the Festlology of the Saints of Ireland. The Felire. The term Culdee refers to Aengus' love of solitude: Ceile De was a name given to the hermits of the time. Aengus, born in Clonengh, Ireland, became a solitary monk on the banks of the river Nore, where he communed with angels. In time he sought a more remote site near Maryborough, erecting a small hermitage there. Visitors drawn by his reputation for holiness drove Aengus to the monastery of Tallaght, near Dublin, then under the control of St. Maelruain. He tried to enter as a simple lay brother, not telling anyone who he was. Aengus, along with Maelruain (who had discovered the Culdee's real identity), wrote the Martyrology of Tallaght together in 790. Aengus completed his Felire in 805 in his Maryborough hermitage, having returned there when Maelruain died. Aengus passed away on March 11, 824, and was buried in Clonenagh.

The year of St Joseph and his upcoming feast day.

Did you know that the Holy Father Pope Francis has announced that 2021 will be the year the Church dedicates to St. Joseph? St Joseph is one of the most powerful intercessors before the throne of God in Heaven? Apart from Our Lady herself no one was closer to Jesus on this Earth than St Joseph. He was there when Our Lord was born in the stable and He would have assisted Jesus throughout His life. Tradition tells us that St Joseph died with Jesus and Mary at his side – perhaps the most beautiful death anyone has ever had. St Teresa of Avila had a great devotion to St Joseph. In her autobiography, the holy Carmelite mystic sings the praises of her holy father, St. Joseph, and gives proof of his powerful intercession: "I took for my patron and lord the glorious St. Joseph and recommended myself earnestly to him. I saw clearly that both out of this my present trouble, and out of others of greater importance, relating to my honor and the loss of my soul, this my father and lord delivered me, and rendered me greater services than I knew how to ask for. I cannot call to mind that I have ever asked him at any time for anything which he has not granted; and I am filled with amazement when I consider the great favors which God hath given me through this blessed Saint; the dangers from which he hath delivered me, both of body and of soul.

As we celebrate the feast of St Joseph on March 19th it would be most fitting and beneficial for us to begin a novena in his honor on Thursday March 11th. Entrust all your cares to him and he like a good father will take care of all your needs. Below is novena which can be prayed any time but particularly in the nine days preceding his feast on March 19th in honor of the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus.

O good father Joseph! I beg you by all your sufferings, sorrows and joys, to obtain for me what I ask.

(Here name your petition).

Obtain for all those who have asked my prayers, everything that is useful to them in the plan of God. Be near to me in my last moments, that I may eternally sing the praises of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Amen.

(Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory be)

Remember, O most pure spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, my great protector, Saint Joseph, that no one ever had recourse to your protection, or implored your aid without obtaining relief. Bishops encourage support of vaccine programmes against Covid-19

Council for Healthcare of the Bishops' Conference urges everyone to support the vaccination programmes currently in place in the Republic and in Northern Ireland

As a matter of priority, vaccines should be made available to carers and to priest-chaplains to nursing care facilities and who preside at funerals

Last December the Irish Catholic Bishops in a statement said that "safe and effective vaccination is an essential aspect of the prevention of disease". They encouraged Catholics to support the programme of vaccination "not only for their own good, but for the protection of life and the health of those who are vulnerable and for the common good of humanity". The Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith made a similar call to all Catholics in its Note on the morality of Covid-19 vaccines (21 December 2020). The Council for Healthcare of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference wishes to reiterate that message and urges everyone to support the vaccination programmes currently in place in the Republic of Ireland and in Northern Ireland. The development and provision of the vaccines is already providing reassurance for those who are most vulnerable to the virus and will help us to return to normality in terms of work, education, religious practice, and sporting and leisure activities as soon as possible. We note that many people both North and South have already received the vaccine and we particularly welcome the fact that all residents and staff of nursing care facilities have been vaccinated at this stage. At present the group prioritised in the Republic of Ireland to receive the vaccine in the coming weeks are those over 70 years of age while in Northern Ireland it is those over 65 years of age along with others who are clinically vulnerable. We encourage all parishes and Church personnel to promote this programme and to encourage elderly parishioners, relatives and neighbours to avail of the opportunity to protect their health and the health of the whole community.
