Message from Bishop Fintan, February 2022

Cork and Ross Diocese Responding to Pope Francis Invitation to a Synodal (Listening) Process

Bishop Fintan indicated that people in the Diocese will shortly have an opportunity to participate in a broad consultation that will feed into the diocesan submission to the Roman Synod on Synodality next year. It is hoped that all those who wish to participate in that conversation will have an opportunity to do so. Bishop Fintan also noted that this process of conversation, communication and consultation will continue over the coming years as part of the Synod of the Irish Church which is underway

Feasts this week 21st: St Enda is considered to be one of the three great late vocations (athlaech) of

Ireland. His sister,



Faenche, a nun, set his thoughts on a religious vocation. He made a small foundation in Cell Aine, Co. Louth, and, after studies in Scotland under Ninian, made several foundations in the Boyne valley. On Faenche's urging he went to Aran. He died probably in 520 and is considered as one of the early models of ascetic monasticism in Ireland.

23rd: St Turibius of Mongrovejo, 1538-1606, was a layman when he was appointed archbishop of Lima, Peru by King Philip II. He combated all the abuses ofthe conquerors in Peru and built up the Church there.

24th: St Macartan belongs to a very early generation of saints in Ireland and is recognised as the first Bishop of Clogher. He is known as Patrick's 'Strong Man' for his dedication and faithfulness. **25th:The Annunciation of the Lord.** 'Giving her consent to God's word, Mary becomes the mother of Jesus. Espousing the divine will for salvation wholeheartedly, without a single sin to restrain her, she gave herself entirely to the person and to the work of her Son; she did so in order to serve the mystery of redemption with him and dependent on him, by God's grace' (CCC, 494).

The Irish Bishops have asked for a Special Collection to be taken up at Masses on the weekend of 26th & 27th March next to support humanitarian efforts in Ukraine and especially the families and children who have had to flee their homeland in advance of the Russian invasion. The proceeds of this Special Collection will be directed to Caritas Internationalis, which is the helping hand of the Church on the ground in the Ukraine and the surrounding region.

Update on Covid Guidelines from Bishop Fintan Gavin, Bishop Fintan sent the following message to all parishes recently.

Protective Measures

It is important that people are encouraged to continue wearing a face covering in the church while priests and Eucharistic Ministers should continue to wear a face covering for the distribution of Holy Communion and in any other liturgical settings that require close contact with people. Hand sanitiser should continue to be provided at entrance and exit doors of churches. It is important that dispensers should be replenished regularly.

Holy Water Fonts: Holy Water fonts can be used again. **Choirs, Cantors and Church Music Groups**

The gradual return of choirs, cantors and church music groups is a welcome step now that we are in the Season of Lent and approach Holy Week and Easter taking into account such risk mitigation measures as good ventilation and mask-wearing. A diocesan webinar for choirs and church music groups will be arranged in the coming weeks.

Parish Ministries

All other parish ministries including Altar Servers, Ministers of the Word and Eucharist, Funeral Ministry, Baptismal Ministry should resume taking all risk mitigation measures into account.

THE SCRUTINIES

Catechumens, now the elect, asking for the three sacraments of initiation at the Easter Vigil, take part in the Scrutinies, celebrated on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent. The scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is

upright, strong and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to

hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God

God of loving kindness, listen favourably to our prayer: strengthen our belief that your Son has risen from the dead and our hope that your servant will also rise again Saint Macartan grew up in the southern part of

Ireland. somewhere in Munster. Before his conversion to Christianity by Patrick, the future saint was known by the name Aidus/Aedh, the son of Caerthen (son of the Rowan Tree). The identity of his father is uncertain, but is sometimes associated with



a Dalcassian prince of Thomond or with the Uí Maine of Connacht. Hence the Anglicized later name to come down to us is "Macartan". Some sources claim that he was uncle to Saint Brigid. Hearing of Patrick's teaching, Aidus traveled from his home to hear him preach in Armagh, leaving behind his wife and child. He first met Patrick at Drumlease, near Dromahair, County Leitrim. Here Macartan was baptized and soon became one of Patrick's official missionary staff. He was spoken of as Patrick's "champion" or "strong man". We are told that when the great Apostle was worn out by his work that Macartan supported his faltering steps over rough roads, marshes and rivers by carrying him. Macartan was initially ordained to the role of presbyter (priest) while Patrick was still living, possible by Patrick himself. He was the "staff of Patrick" in the Irish patron saint's declining years. On one occasion after carrying Patrick over a river, an exhausted Macartan expressed a wish that he might be relieved from further travel and allowed settle down in charge of some church close by his beloved master where he could spend the evening of his life in peace. Patrick, full of sympathy for his faithful companion and friend, agreed that he should establish a monastery in Clogher, and finish out his life there. A monastery was established near the ancient royal fort of Rathmore on the outskirts of the town and one of Ireland's oldest bishoprics was established. To commemorate the occasion Patrick gave Macartan his staff and a number of precious relics contained in a shrine known to tradition as the Domnach Airgid. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Mac_Cairthinn_of_Clogher
