Liturgical Calendar - Ordinary Time - When we think of the liturgical seasons we typically think of the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. These seasons celebrate what could be thought of as "The Main Event." Namely, the incarnation, birth, passion, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus. But since last Monday 9th January, we have returned to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time isn't ordinary. It's much more than that. The 33 (or 34 depending on how the feasts fall) weeks of Ordinary Time contain Jesus' earthly ministry and some of the major events of the Gospels we have come to know and love. The miracles, the parables, the calling of the twelve, the sermon on the mount, the bread of life discourse. . . we get all that and more during this season. Truly, there is much to celebrate.

Technically, Ordinary Time has two parts, but it remains one season. The first part begins right after the feast of the Epiphany and runs until Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday (when Lent begins). The second part begins the Monday after Pentecost and runs until the First Sunday of Advent. This part is typically about twice the length of the first.

Here's a short list of ways you can fully embrace this liturgical season:

1. **Examine your habits.** Your day-to-day life is typically just a series of habits played out one after the other. If you want your life to change, the first place to look is your habits. A great new habit to start – read the daily Gospel.

2. **Gratitude.** Joy always finds its root in gratitude. Try starting each day by thanking God for five ordinary, everyday things. If you have a family, try going around the table at dinner time and list off things together.

3. Use your imagination to reflect on the daily life of Jesus. Imagine Jesus doing the simple things. Eating, walking, joking with his friends.

4. **Praying.** Make yourself a bystander to the Gospel stories in your imagination. Ordinary Time is anything but ordinary. But the true power of the season is only unlocked if you live it!

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th to the 25th of January 2023 - The theme for Christian Unity week this year is Do good; seek justice, from Isaiah 1:17 – 'Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow.' Isaiah challenged God's people in his day to learn to do good together; to seek justice together, to rescue the oppressed together, to defend the orphan and plead for the widow together. The prophet's challenge applies equally to us today. How can we live our unity as Christians so as to confront the evils and injustices of our time? Let us be open to God's presence in all our encounters with each other. Let us engage in the struggle for justice in our society. After all, we all belong to Christ.

Ministers of the Word – We are seeking new Ministers to read at the **6.30pm Saturday evening Vigil Mass.** We have very few ministers for this Mass. If anyone who attends this Mass and is willing to become a Minister of the Word, please give your name and contact number to the parish office. Training will be provided.

We are also seeking Ministers of the Eucharist for the 9.30am weekday Masses. Children's Mass - The parish would like to reintroduce a "children's Mass".
