HOW MANY HOLY WELLS IN YOUR PARISH?

he 387 surviving holy wells in Co Cork date mostly from when public practice of the Catholic religion was forbidden, though some predate this period. They are generally in secluded places where customs and piseogs still exist. These were places of prayer, meditation, even baptism.

Three extensively documented holy wells can be found in Castlehaven & Myross parish. Saint Brigid is associated with the townland of Ardra, overlooking the picturesque Oileán Bhríghide. Strangely, this well is said to have originated on the island but was supernaturally transported to the mainland where, on Lá Fhéile Bhríghide (1 February), locals come to pray and take some water. A cure for eye ailments is asso-

ciated with it. Many wells are found alongside a *singirlín* or rag tree, where people hang their worries and, as the rags disintegrate, so too do their worries.

Another secluded well is Saint Barrahane's (Tobar Bearcháin) at Castlehaven Strand, locally known as *Tobar na Súl*. Barrahane's feast day is 3 December and the custom here is to walk around the well three times in a clockwise direction, praying as you go.

At Toe Head, visitors to Tobar Phartaláin place pebbles in the water to honour St Bartholomew who was himself cured of blindness. On 14 May (today), patrons take water home, making sure not to take any of the magical eels with them.

So how do we know so much about holy wells? Many are mapped in the Ordnance Survey maps of 1841, while stories are recorded in the Schools' Collection of 1938. Generations of locals have also ensured that holy wells have been preserved. This is how it should be.

PARISH LEADERSHIP TEAM – Over the weeks of May we have begun to look at this topic and share with you some thoughts. This is the second part: A leadership team is not made up of "yes father" people. A team allows for different opinions to be considered and helps ensure the best decisions are made. It helps deal with blind spots of the individuals, through the collective effort of the team. Leadership team members are themselves supporting other teams in the parish (Parish Pastoral Council, Ministers of the Word, Communion Ministers, Finance, Maintenance, etc) it helps ensure a unity of vision and purpose. The four nonnegotiables of a leadership team are: 1. Unanimity of vision. 2. Balance of strengths. 3. Healthy conflict and trust. 4. Vulnerability (The first two get people on board. The second two keep them there.)

Let's look at **Unanimity of Vision and Balance of Strengths:** Vision is essentially about where the parish is heading. Imagine four people in a canoe in the middle of a lake. Each person is paddling frantically towards a different shore. You know what is going to happen, nothing - or at best, they will go round and round in circles, getting exhausted and going nowhere. If there are two visions, if each person is there to protect his/her own patch, there will be "de-vision". There must be an agreed vision, one shared vision for all to work towards. There is no such thing as a balanced person! We are all a little odd (some of us more than others!)

There is, however, a balanced team. A Leadership team must identify the strengths of each individual and at the same time they must identify the blind spots of each individual team member and then find a balance. You may be gifted in one area, like organising, but you may have a blind spot in the area of budgeting. A balanced team would have someone who is gifted in budgeting, and may not be so great in organising things, so they complement each other. (We will look at parts three and four next week.) **Reflection Questions:**

- What are the positives that you feel in the Parish? What are the frustrations that you feel in the parish?
- Can our parish move from maintenance (keeping things as they always have been) to mission (focus on the evangelisation of others beyond ourselves?) What needs to happen?
- Where would you like to see our parish in five years' time? Reflect and pray about your own vision for our parish? Write it down, share it with a friend.
